Climate Change Crisis

Climate change cannot be stopped: however, it can be slowed. While the effects of human activities on Earth's climate to date are irreversible on the timescale of humans alive today, every little bit of avoided future temperature increases results in less warming. The temperature record was broken in 2024 and was the hottest year since the record keeping began in 1880.



Left unchecked, these impacts will worsen, affecting our homes, economies food and water supplies as well as species, ecosystems and biodiversity of the planet.

Global temperature is estimated to warm by 1.5 degrees by 2050. Parts of the UK will be in danger of flooding, with the low lying and coastal cities at particular risk. Any time after 2030, the Thames barrier could be breached and London could flood. This is because predictions indicate that sea levels will rise by 80cm by 2080. The countries that will be least affected by climate change include Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland and Singapore. The top three environmental issues are: climate change, pollution and biodiversity loss. Parts of the UK will soon be in danger of flooding with low lying and costal areas in particular risk. Farming in the UK will also be further attacked.

Some effects of climate change are: temperature increase, severe storms, increased drought, loss of species, warming oceans, not enough food and more health risks. People can reduce the risk of climate change by making choices that will reduce greenhouse gas emissions and by preparing for change in the expected future. Renewable energy sources and restoring forests and critical ecosystems will help reduce this climate crisis. We need to work together to stop climate change from getting worse.


Dejojotheawsome Create

Dejojotheowsome is a Minecraft Create YouTuber. Create is a Minecraft mod that gives Minecraft the Industrial Revolution. Create is such a big mod, that it has its own mods for it. Dejojotheawsome uses some of these mods.

Dejojotheawsome also does Create guides like 'Create basics' or 'Steam engines'. Dejojotheawsome revews create mod addons, like create: new age and create: steam and rails.



Dejojo's recent video on Create's newest update 'Post Production' showed what you can do with Create, 6.0 (QR code below). The update is also known as the Amazon update because it adds cardboard boxes. It adds a new block, the chain conveyer (which allows cardboard boxes to travel long distances) as well as RPM and SU. The new update also adds hanging from the chain conveyer (image below) with a wrench. In addition to this, it adds frogport, which allows the cardboard boxes to go onto the chain conveyers. To make cardboard packages, you need a packager, some form of red stone power, and a chest. There are many other things the update adds, like stock links, which I will go into more detail about in our next edition. Download create 6.0 on your PC (only available on java)!






Duo's Death


Deyes High Ski Trip

Hoppy Easter!

Near the Barisan mountains, in Sumatra, Indonesia, lives the rarest rabbit in the world: the Sumatran striped rabbit. Known for its dark brown stripes and short ears, these rabbits are extremely sparse. Threatened by habitat loss, these rabbits are so quaint that not even locals know they exist. As the species is rare, nocturnal and found only in remote forests, little is known about it. The forests which the species inhabits are being cleared more and more for timber, tea and coffee plantations, and human inhabitation. Its only been caught on camera three times- all by Bukit Barisan Selatan National Park





Meanwhile in North America, the smallest rabbit known to man is found, the Pygmy Rabbit. With its adorable features, these little bunnies weigh only between 375 and 500 grams which is around the same weight as two pears! Pygmy rabbits are normally found in areas on deep soils with tall, dense sagebrush which they use for shelter and food. These rabbits live in the wild and do have predators but they still have a large population. They have a body length between 23.5 and 29.5 centimetres. The pygmy rabbit is distinguishable from other leporids by its small size, short ears, grey colour, small hind legs, and lack of white fuzzy fur.

On the other hand, the biggest rabbit in the world is the Flemish rabbit. The Flemish Rabbit (also known as the gentle giant) originated in Flanders, Belgium where it was bred in the city of Ghent as early as the 16th century. They weigh an average of 6.8 kilograms but the largest weigh a staggering 22 kilograms! They live for around 8-10 years and were originally hunted for their fur and meat. Nowadays they are kept in rabbit shows or kept as pets especially in Europe and North America.





The Neverland Dwarf Rabbit is known as one of the cutest rabbits in the world. With its button eyes and stout body, it is a very common and popular pet. Originating in the Neverlands, these fluffy bunnies were used for breeding. Through generations of selective breeding, the modern Netherland Dwarf has become a gentle, friendly pet rabbit, though it still can retain a more energetic disposition than larger breeds. The diet of a Netherlands Dwarf consists of an unlimited supply of hay, vegetables and good quality pellets.
