

Open Evening Inspires Future Students



Our Year 6 Open Evening was a fantastic success, with over 1,000 primary students, families, and carers visiting to explore our new school building and see learning in action.

Visitors enjoyed a wide range of activities, including sports challenges, a chocolate taste test, Sherlock Holmes Murder Mystery, live music, collaborative printmaking mural, practical cooking demonstrations and exciting science experiments with bangs and explosions.

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive. One parent said, "Thank you for an amazing experience. We really enjoyed the tour, meeting teachers, and finding out about enrichment opportunities. The new facilities are excellent." A student added, "I loved the sports challenges and can't wait to come to Deyes."

Thank you to all staff and students who made the evening so welcoming and engaging.

New Building Delivering Real Impact



A year after opening, Deyes High School has become a benchmark for modern education design. Delivered by Kier for the Department for Education and Lydiate Learning Trust, the 10,000 sqm school has quickly established itself as a high-performing, future-ready environment, improving outcomes, behaviour, and community connections.

In its first year, the school used just 67% of the DfE's energy target, making it highly efficient. Solar panels generated over 478,000 kWh of clean electricity — enough to power more than 66,000 LED lightbulbs continuously for a month. Features like hybrid ventilation, a BioSolar roof, heat pumps, and improved insulation ensure classrooms are consistently comfortable, energy-efficient, and cost-effective. Students have also gained hands-on experience learning about construction careers and sustainable building practices, connecting classroom lessons to real-world applications.

The educational impact is clear. Attendance and attitudes to learning have improved, and low-level disruption has reduced. Classrooms feel calmer and more focused, supported by stable temperatures and strong acoustic control.

Head of School Vickie Beaney said: "Over the past year, we've seen a real difference across the school — students are more engaged, focused, and enjoying their learning, while staff report fewer behavioural issues and more collaborative support between pupils. Our new building has quietly transformed the day-to-day environment. Deyes is built on family values, and our partnership with Kier has helped shape not just the school's spaces, but the culture that makes this community thrive."

Parent and carer engagement has increased, and the building's efficient layout is delivering tangible gains — students now gain up to seven extra minutes of learning time per lesson.

The school's wider role has grown too. Over the past year, community groups have increasingly used the facilities for sports, classes, meetings, and events. Staff morale is strong, and students report improved wellbeing, reinforcing the link between thoughtful design and a positive school culture.

Kier Senior Project Manager Andy Brayne added: "Delivering Deyes High School was about creating an environment that drives educational excellence and sustainability. This project sets a benchmark for future schools, combining energy efficiency with spaces that inspire learning and community engagement."



Primary Pupils Experience Deyes



Pupils from Green Park and Summerhill Primary Schools spent an exciting day at Deyes High School, taking part in a full timetable of lessons designed to give them a real feel for secondary school life.

The day began with a welcome assembly before students rotated through practical subjects including Food Technology, Design Technology, Drama and PE.

Mrs Beaney, Headteacher at Deyes High School, said: "This transition event helps pupils see that high school is a welcoming, engaging place where learning is hands-on and confidence grows quickly."

Mr Patten, Head of Transition at Deyes High School, added: "Our aim is to make the move to secondary school seamless. It's brilliant to see pupils so engaged and already building relationships with staff and each other."

Primary staff were equally enthusiastic. A Year 6 Teacher at Green Park Primary, commented: "Our pupils loved every minute — especially the practical lessons. They left buzzing about what's ahead next year."

Students agreed. One pupil from Summerhill said: "I really liked the drama lesson and how everyone joined in — it felt like we were already part of the school."

Another from Green Park added: "The teachers were really friendly, and I can't wait to come back when I start in Year 7."

At the end of the day, pupils received certificates of participation before heading back to their schools — a fitting end to a day full of learning, fun and excitement about the next stage of their education.

Careers Festival Inspires Students







Deyes High School's annual Careers Festival 2025 brought together hundreds of students, employers, and education providers for a day focused on future pathways, ambition, and opportunity. The event showcased more than 40 exhibitors from employers, further and higher education, and public services.

Students from all year groups explored a diverse range of career routes — from healthcare, engineering, and law to creative industries, apprenticeships, and university study. Workshops, talks, and one-to-one conversations gave students the chance to ask practical questions about entry routes, skills, and real-world job experiences.

Mrs. Beaney, Head of School, commented: "Our focus is on preparing students for life beyond school. Events like this connect learning with real opportunity and show our young people what's possible when they aim high and stay curious."

Ryan from Year 13 commented: "Talking to universities about courses and entry requirements has been amazing as I'd love a career in Musical Theatre."

Harrison from Year 11 added: "Discussions with various providers have opened my mind to degree subjects; I plan to pursue computer science and game development."

The Deyes High School Careers Festival is a key part of the school's careers programme, which includes mock interviews, employer visits, 'Meet the Professional' talks, work experience and personalised guidance for every student.



Competing against elite fighters from across the globe, Alexandros secured two WKU World Titles in Points Fighting and Light Contact, along with additional podium finishes that underline his consistency and competitive edge. His success reflects discipline, technical skill and a level of composure rarely seen at his age.

The championships are recognised as one of the most demanding events on the international kickboxing calendar. Earning even a single title is a major accomplishment — claiming two marks Alexandros out as an athlete with significant potential.

Alexandros has trained relentlessly for this season, balancing high-level sport with his academic commitments and maintaining the focus needed to compete on the world stage. His achievement sets a strong example for students across the school: ambition matched with hard work delivers results.
